## **COVID-19 and Systemic Racism**



#### **Scenario 1**

In the wake of nationwide protests, criminal justice stakeholders and other local elected representatives hold a virtual town hall with community members. The City Council president shares a new resolution declaring racism a public health emergency. Several system stakeholders share that they are working to add race and ethnicity data into the county's public-facing criminal justice dashboard.

Community members express frustration at the pace of change locally, including the lack of meaningful reduction of race/ethnic disparities in the jail population despite a large number of releases related to COVID decarceration efforts. Several people express that the resolution and increased data are simply not sufficient. A group of advocates ask why racial disparities in education are being ignored in the discussion. Overall, community members are asking for more concrete actions from government.

Spike in local crime attributed to release of state's inmates as part of COVID-19 early releases housing prisoners in local motels
